





rags are also commonly found in automobile maintenance garages. Often times, employees toss their oily rags in a pile on the floor or dispose of them improperly. However, if oily rags are not stored or disposed of properly, they can auto-ignite and start a fire which could damage your business, home, and/or possessions.

How can a pile of oily rags sitting on your garage floor start a fire? As oily rags begin to dry, heat is produced. If they're thrown into a pile, oxygen is trapped underneath. The combination of heat, oxygen, and the cloth can lead to spontaneous combustion, which could result in a fire that could destroy your property.

Listed below are some tips for storing and disposing of oily rags:

- Never store oily rags in a pile. Used rags should be spread out in a safe, flat area to dry. Once they're dry, check with your city or municipality for proper disposal instructions.
- Store the rags in an airtight, non-combustible metal container. If you plan to use your rags later, this step is critical. The metal container should be filled with a solution of water and an oil breakdown detergent.
- Take the container to your local hazardous waste disposal center, or arrange a special pickup by your garbage pickup service. Many municipalities also host hazardous waste drop-off/pickup days.
- Never pour oily water down a drain in or around your home. Do not wash, recycle, or compost oily rags. Synthetic oil-based products are highly toxic. If washed or composted, the toxic chemicals will then be reintroduced into the environment.
- A clean work area can help prevent a fire from spreading and getting bigger by limiting the fire's fuel source.

Understanding the potential for the self-heating and spontaneous combustion of oily rags, and following the guidelines for proper disposal are key steps in fire prevention.
